### **Year One Trip to Brooklands Museum**

Year One had an exciting adventure at Brooklands Museum, exploring the world of transport! The children saw incredible racing cars, a historic bus, and even the famous Concorde – what an amazing experience!

The day was filled with curiosity, fun, and plenty of questions as they learned about different types of transport from the past and present. It was a fantastic trip, creating wonderful memories for everyone.

### **Year One News**

This week in literacy, we have been learning about the rules for plurals – adding s or es. The children enjoyed a hands-on lesson, where they found objects and decided which rule applied. This practical approach made the learning experience fun and engaging!

In Maths, we have been exploring the number line up to 50. We started the week by identifying missing numbers on our classroom number line. The children then practised estimating and making good guesses. We also discussed the concept of halfway on a number line and determined whether numbers were more or less than halfway.

The highlight of the week was their visit to Brooklands! The children began their day at the Bus Museum, where they had the chance to sit on both an old-fashioned and a modern-day bus. They even dressed up as conductors and tried out a bus simulator! Later, they explored the museum, searching for the oldest plane, car, and bike. They also had a turn sitting in a racing car and walking through Concorde. The children behaved wonderfully and were fantastic representatives of our school.

In Science, we have been learning about fruits and vegetables. The children explored different types and identified whether we eat the root, leaves, flowers, stem, seeds, or fruit of the plant. This lesson sparked great discussions about healthy eating and plant growth.

It has been a fantastic week of learning and discovery!

#### **Year Two News**

This week, the children wrote an apology letter from Milo the Cloud to Lizzy, reflecting on his frequent temper tantrums. The children also explored the suffixes – full and -less, using them to enhance their writing with exciting adjectives. Later in the week, we turned our attention to poetry, crafting spring-themed pieces. After brainstorming as a class and in pairs – using techniques such as alliteration, personification, similes, and metaphors – the children independently composed their own poems.

Here is how Estrella began her poem:

Spring is beginning, blooming buds, slowly awakening

In Maths, Year 2 continued applying their understanding of money to two-step problem-solving. The children used bar models to decide which operations were needed, with plenty of discussion and demonstration of different strategies. Rory particularly enjoyed using the bar model, as it helped him choose the correct operation, and he's a big fan of partitioning because "it helps me add mentally in my head!"

In Science, Mercury class decided to investigate what plants need to grow. To test this, they are observing how cress grows under different conditions – without sunlight, warmth, cotton wool to anchor the roots, and with excessive watering. We're eagerly awaiting the results over the next couple of weeks!

In topic, the children stepped back in time to explore Victorian toys and made thaumatropes – an optical illusion that combines two images through movement. The children attached a pre-drawn design to a straw, and after lots of spinning, they watched the images merge! Next week, we'll take it a step further by designing our own images.

### **Summer Uniform**

In our calm room, the children used different shapes to create their own tractors, learning how tractors help farmers get around the farm. We also loved spending time outdoors, enjoying the beautiful weather. The children continued to look for signs of spring and created some beautiful observational drawings of daffodils. ## **Reception News**

We have had another great week of learning and playing in Reception.

Continuing our farm topic, Mars have been enjoying the book 'Farmer Duck' by Martin Waddell and Helen Oxenbury, and have written letters all about it. In Neptune class, we have focused on 'Farmyard Hullaballoo' by Giles Andreae and David Wojtowycz, and drawn super story maps of an imaginary tractor ride around the farm. In our classrooms, we have been making collages of tractors plus designing and building miniature farms using building blocks and toy animals. We are getting really excited about our trip to Bockett's Farm next Thursday and can't wait to see a real-life farm in action.

In phonics, we have now finished teaching all the Phase 3 sounds with the last few being ure, er and air. We have sent home a sound mat with all of these digraphs (2 letters that make 1 sound,) and trigraphs (3 letters that make 1 sound,) for you to use at home. In the coming weeks, we will revisit all of the sounds learnt since September to revise any we are usure of.

In Maths, our focus this week has been doubles. We have been using numicon butterflies to double numbers, stamping paint dots on dominoes and using mirrors. Some children have even been talking about odd and even numbers and halves as well – very impressive.
